RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



With the arrival of the month of Elul, we have entered the period of preparation for the upcoming Days of Awe. During this month, as especially from Rosh Hashanah thought Yom Kippur, we are to examine our lives, do our best to repair broken relationships, and, after repentance and prayer, we are to perform acts of Tzedakah, giving to others and acting with righteousness. What better way could there be to begin the new year than to actively help save the lives of others. On Sunday, September 23, the weekend between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we will have the opportunity to do just that!

Each year, thousands of people of all ages are diagnosed with leukemia, sickle cell anemia and other life-threatening diseases. For many of these patients, a life-saving marrow transplant from a matching donor is their best hope for a cure. 70%

of patients will not find a matching donor in their own family. As a result, they turn to Be The Match Registry in search of an unrelated donor whose tissue-type matches their own. Because tissue-type, like eye-color, is hereditary, a patient is more likely to match a donor from his or her own racial or ethnic background. Because all minority groups are underrepresented on the marrow registry, many minority patients experience a difficult time finding a matching donor and receiving the transplant they need to cure them of their disease.

Each of us has the unique power to heal and save a life, but we must be typed and registered so that patients can find us. Anyone between the ages of 18-60, in generally good health, and willing to donate to any patient he or she may match is eligible to join the marrow donor registry. Joining the marrow donor registry simply means you are willing to make yourself available to donate your marrow or blood stem cells to any patient you may match. As a matter of fact, most potential donors listed on the registry never donate because most are never identified as match.

If a potential donor is ever identified as a match after joining the marrow donor registry, the most common way of donating today is a method called PBSC or Peripheral Blood Stem Cell donation which is much like giving blood, and it is generally used 80% of the time in most transplant centers. The other way of donating is a one-day outpatient procedure called a Marrow donation. Although this is considered a surgical procedure, there is no cutting or stitches required. The donor receives anesthesia and feels no pain. A needle is inserted into the donor's pelvic bone where 1-5% of the donor's liquid marrow is collected. A simple bandage covers the needle insertion site. Contrary to popular belief, most donors resume normal activities the very next day.

<u>Joining the registry is easy and only requires you to complete a donor consent form and swab your cheeks with a long Q-tip.</u> On Sunday, September 23rd, a Marrow Donor Registration Drive will be held at the Congregation Children of Israel between 11:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m.

I am asking that each of us, even those who have already been tested and are already in the registry or who are unable to be a donor, participate in this life saving effort. You can actively encourage others to come and be tested, you can come and help out the day of the testing, or you can make a financial contribution, of whatever amount, to help cover the cost of testing. Let's come together and step forward as a truly caring congregation in this life saving endeavor. What better way to start the new year than by putting into practice the values of our Judaism through this program.

The "Family of Man" and Me!

I was quite apprehensive about going to this new Temple and this particular service. I had never been there before and I did not know what to expect. I was met in the driveway by a leader of the Congregation and he led me to the entrance. I opened the door and there were young greeters to meet me and make the initial contact a positive one. They directed me to the sanctuary and I took my place in the back of the hall.

People began to arrive and I immediately noticed that the women were sitting on the right side and the men on the left. I did not think of that as being unusual in and of itself because I certainly had seen it in Israel and growing up in the New York Jewish world. I also noticed music wafting throughout the room. It gave me a sense of belonging and put me in the frame of mind to join in the prayer service.

As more people arrived they acknowledged my presence, but they also acknowledged each other in a familiar and endearing manner. It was obvious they were used to praying and being together. I was struck by the youngsters accompanying their parents and as much as a pre-teen can, they connected with what was going on even if, in some instances, they were in their parents arms. It instantly gave me a sense of the common bonds between us.

The ironic part of this scenario was that I was not in an Orthodox *Shul* nor was I in a Reform Temple. I was at the Guru Singh Sabha Sikh Temple in Evans. Because it was a Friday night I was there at the request of Rabbi Klensin to represent our Congregation and subsequently the Jewish Community at the Memorial Service for the six congregants slain at the Sikh Temple in Wisconsin the week before.

What came over me over the next hour was not our differences with the Sikh religious community but our similarities. I had called earlier to see if a Kipah was permissible because a head covering is expected. The answer was absolutely. When I walked in a person was chanting and a tabla player was accompanying him. Not unlike the *z'me-rot* played at the beginning of our services. They both serve to put us in a frame of reflection. The Guru defined the Sikh religion as monotheistic just as ours is and their scripture, the Guru Granth Sahib, is read from a very large book opened on their Bimah. Not unlike our Torah. After the service we were sent downstairs for a wonderful repast similar to our Oneg Shabbat.

The entire evening made me feel like we were in fact part of the greater "Family of Man" rather than from disparate religious and ethnic groups. It was a good feeling and one that we must all strive to achieve.

We were also there to memorialize the slain Sikh worshippers and to tell the world that we collectively cannot tolerate the abhorrent direction many are taking which cause the shootings and massacres that are all too often happening around the world today.






