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RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



What is the correct way to spell the name of the Jewish holiday that begins this year on the eve of Thanksgiving? *Chanukah? Chanukkah? Channukah? Channukkah?* Or maybe it is one of those spellings, but without the "h" at the end. Or should you spell it with an "H" (*Hanukah*) instead of "Ch" at the beginning so people will not pronounce it beginning with "ch" as in the English words "chop" or "chair." Actually the correct spelling is using the Hebrew letters: *chet, nun, kaf, hey.* As for the English spelling, it really does not matter how you spell it.

But the more important question is, what does it mean? The word Chanukah means "dedication," celebrating the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem which had been desecrated by the Syrian Greeks. These Hellenists wanted to put an end to the Jewish faith and

practice, forcing us to worship the Greek gods and to accept Hellenistic culture. We celebrate not only the rededication of the Temple, but even more importantly, the victory of the Maccabees and their followers over the Syrian Greeks and over those Jews who were eager to replace their Judaism with Hellenism. But the dedication also refers to the commitment of Mattathias, his sons and their followers, to God and Torah, to Jewish practice and Jewish values.

What is most important is that we also rededicate ourselves to our Judaism. The recent Pew Research Center study of the American Jews raises concerns about the increasing number of Jews who say they have "no religion," but are Jewish by ancestry, ethnicity, or culture.

While the numbers are important, whether it be the number of Jews in the United States, in the world, or right here in the CSRA, what is more important is the quality of our Judaism, our dedication to Judaism, its practice and values. Fortunately we are not living in a time where we have to risk our lives to practice and to perpetuate Judaism. But the future of Judaism depends on our commitment to Jewish learning, to Jewish practice, to our involvement in the our synagogue and the Jewish community, and to living a life guided by Jewish values.

I urge you to consider taking part in the opportunities below and elsewhere in this Newsletter to enrich your Judaism.

Chai Mitzvah: An Innovative Initiative for Adults

Chai Mitzvah encourages adults to take some time to reflect on where they are Jewishly and what they would like to achieve. This program is based on the idea that Being Jewish means you learn all your life. There's always something new to learn, do, explore, apply. Most of us were taught about Judaism as children, but as adults we need to explore and develop our own Jewish lives. Chai Mitzvah has five basic components in a nine-month program: 1. Group study once each month, 2. Personal study, 3. Adopt a ritual/spiritual practice 4. Take part in a social action commitment, and 5. Celebrate the achievement! Wherever you are in your Jewish life, Chai Mitzvah will provide a path toward deciding how you want to live your adult Jewish life. Find out more about Chai Mitzvah at www.chaimitzvah.org. 

Your Augusta Jewish Community Sunday School (AJCSS) has been extremely busy! Each class is being inspired by dedicated teachers, caring rabbis, and supportive Madrichim (aides). We have had an Open House, and Parent's Meeting with Warren Umansky presenting ideas to reinforce a positive Jewish identity. Here are some highlights by class.

Bagels and Blox The class meets 8 times during the year with our next class on November 17th. It has been our fastest growing class with 8 students currently attending.

They focus on a creative Jewish learning experience using crafts, music, and storytelling. It is a chance for the parent and child to experience the beginning of fun Jewish learning. PreK and K This semester we have been talking about the creation of the world. We also learned all about Shabbat such as a full service to include prayers, and customs. 1st and 2nd We started the year learning a deeper understanding of Judaism. We are reading a lot of stories to learn about the holidays including Shabbat. The students in our class enjoy art and crafts and really enjoyed making edible Sukkahs. Jan Bledsoe – teacher and Dani Kronowski – Madricha



 3^{rd} and 4^{th} We learned about the fall Holidays including Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, and Simchat Torah. The Torah stories come alive in this class such as Creation, Cain and Abel, Noah, Tower of Babel, etc. The students are picking up the material and enjoying their study of G-d. 5th thru 7th This semester we are learning about the Tanach and reasons why it is relevant in our modern times. We are being creative and working on a play on Hanukkah that will be presented to the school and parents on November 3rd. Cards were created by our students that will be sent to both American and Israeli soldiers letting them know how we appreciate their work. Our AJCSS is fortunate to have such dedicated teachers along with creative Music support in Joanne Green and Sarah Sirull (also Hebrew). 



CHANUKAH BLESSINGS

Chanukah begins this year with the lighting of the first candle on Wednesday Evening, Nov. 27.

Candles are added to the *Hanukiyah* from right to left but are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first. (On the Shabbat of Hanukkah, kindle the Hanukkah lights first and then the Shabbat candles.) Light the *Shamash* - the helper candle - first using it to kindle the rest of the Chanukah lights; say or sing:

The First Blessing

Praised are You, Adonai, Our God, Ruler of the universe, Who made us holy through Your commandments and commanded us to kindle the Hanukah lights.

The Second Blessing

Praised are You, Adonai, Our God, Ruler of the universe, Who performed wondrous deeds for our ancestors in those ancient days at this season.
