



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

C. G. Montefiore once wrote:

"We Jews have a more pressing responsibility for our lives and beliefs than perhaps any other religious community.

"Don't shelter yourself in any course of action by the idea that 'it is my affair.' It is your affair, but it is also mine and the community's. Nor can we neglect the world beyond. A fierce light beats upon the Jew. It is a grave responsibility this - to be a Jew; and you can't escape from it, even if you choose to ignore it. Ethically or religiously, we Jews can be and do nothing light-heartedly. Ten bad Jews may help damn us; ten good Jews may help to save us. *Which minyan will you join*?" (emphasis added)

So why do I reference this quote? First, because I am so proud of the Temple that I belong to. While everyone's lives' are getting busier and busier, there are still "good Jews" in our midst who step forward and shoulder some heavy responsibility. You may not see all of the activity happening at the Temple, but I am amazed at how much is accomplished when the need and the request arises. For example, Jeanie Brody and Jeff Wolf coordinated and repaired the parking lot pot hole. Thank you! David Alalof and his Rabbi Search committee have been reviewing dozens of resumes and writing samples as well as interviewing potential candidates via Skype in an effort to narrow down the candidates. Thank you! Michael Scharff & Lou Scharff (and I'm sure many more) purchased and installed an HDTV that will be an invaluable asset for the Temple and future educational and social events. Thank you! Rabbi & Francine Klensin have been working tirelessly to make sure that the Temple continues to run smoothly, and have even agreed to host the first of monthly family hosted Havdalah/social events on February 21. Thank you! Cathy Goldenberg has been an unbelievable treasure, cooking Shabbat dinners, wrangling volunteers to assist in setting up or serving when needed, and pretty much filling any gap needed when it comes to getting dinner served. Thank you! And much much more.

But secondly, because, while these people have been working tirelessly and impressively, the Temple's foundation relies on the strength of its entire congregation. Each and every one of you are busier than busy. I know, I am right there with you. But I also know that each of you could promise 2 hours a week to the Temple (break it up any way you want). The next time you see an e mail asking for your input about an event or idea, take a moment to really think about it before you hit the Delete button. *It only takes a few moments to make difference, but that difference may make a lasting change*.

Cast a Vote for Reform Values in Israel

As Jews, lovers of Israel and unconditional supporters of Israel's right to exist, we are well aware of the many serious challenges confronting Israel today as well as the threats faced by the Jewish people everywhere. It is up to those who live in Israel to elect the Prime Minister and members of Knesset. But Jews living in the Diaspora can influence the nature of Israeli society by voting in the World Zionist Organization's current election. The WZO, together with the Jewish Agency, is designated in Israeli law as the formal liaison between the Jewish Diaspora and the Israeli government. It is the vehicle through which Jews around the world are officially invited to make their views known to Israel and, in a small way, make policy and funding.

In addition to the existential questions confronting the state, as Reform Jews, we are also faced with serious questions concerning societal and institutional values.

Questions like:

- ⇒ Will Israeli society and institutions respect and fairly treat all denominations, regardless of level of observance?
- \Rightarrow Will gender equality be the norm where men and women can pray and live as equals?
- \Rightarrow Will we see lasting peace with security and stability for the land and people of Israel?

These are serious questions that not only affect our relationship with Israel, but which will shape the soul of the country in the years to come.

Our Reform Movement is committed to not only supporting our brothers and sisters in Israel but to also help shape its future. Together, we have an opportunity to advocate for an Israeli society that represents our values and clearly puts forth our vision for Israel – a vision in which the ideals of pluralism, equality and peace are accepted.

TO BE SUCCESFUL, WE NEED YOUR HELP and YOUR PARTICIPATION IS IMPORTANT!!

Next year, in October of 2015, the World Zionist Congress (WZC) will convene in Jerusalem. This "Parliament of the Jewish People" will debate and make decisions about critical issues that shape Israel and influence whether it will fulfill the dreams of its founders—a pluralistic and democratic Jewish State.

You have a critical voice in that discussion. How? In the upcoming election, you have the opportunity to vote for the ARZA slate thereby assuring that ARZA's delegates represent our values in the United States' delegation to the WZC. The delegation from the United States is determined by an election conducted by the American Zionist Movement (AZM), an election which is taking place now through April 30,2015. Voting is easy and can be completed online or by paper ballot. All Jews over the age of 18 (as of June 30, 2015) can vote. One need not be a member of any other organization or Jewish institution in order to vote.

These elections are the strongest way for US Reform Jews to promote and encourage the progressive ideals of social justice, equality and democracy in Israel and help build the kind of Jewish state we all know is possible—a Jewish state that holds true to the ideals of religious pluralism, the growth of Reform Judaism in Israel, women's equality in all areas of life, democracy, and a solution to the ongoing conflict. The election is also important because the composition of the WZC has both financial and policy implications in Israel, as resources are allocated based on the number of seats a party holds and the policy positions of those parties.

ARZA, representing Reform Judaism, is asking every American Jew who holds these values dear to stand with us. Here is what we hope you will do in the coming weeks:

□ **Vote**: I urge you to join me in voting for ARZA-Representing Reform Judaism at www.reformjews4israel.org between now and April 30th. Voting is easy and quick. Because the election itself is self-financing, the cost for voting is \$10.00 for those over age 30 and \$5.00 for those 30 and under.

⇒ **Spread the word**: Please encourage others to vote - family, friends and fellow congregants.

⇒ The future of K'lal Yisrael is in our hands. Let us join with Reform and progressive Jews across the country and make sure that our voices are heard. Please call me if you have any questions.



CCI's Caring Congregation

Let Us Strengthen One Another Through Thoughtful Involvement

The Betty Padilla Caring Congregation Fund was established several years ago in memory of Betty Padilla, a devoted CCI member and past present of our Sisterhood, to help support our Congregants who might be in need of assistance. The Caring Congregation Committee is the vehicle for that service and encourages <u>all</u> Temple members to become involved in some capacity.

A Caring Community has many functions with the ultimate goal of strength through bonding with several ways to achieve this objective. The following is a suggested list of supportive groups that make up our Caring Community, but your help is needed to strengthen who we are and what we do:

- <u>Meal of Condolence and Shiva Services</u> When a family loses a loved one, a light dairy meal is prepared to greet the mourners when they return from the funeral. This group coordinates and prepares the food, in addition to providing refreshments following home Shiva Services. The expenses can be covered by the Betty Padilla Caring Congregation Fund. Present members of this group are the following but more members are welcome: *Jeanie Brody, Karen Aaronson, Alaine Handfinger, Meryl Alalof, Karel Copenhaver, Marian Shapiro. Cathy Goldenberg has agreed to chair this important work.*
- <u>Shmira</u> Jewish tradition encourages, as an act of great respect, that when a person passes away, he or she not be left alone from the time of death until burial. The shomer (sitter) who performs the Shmira can be a family member, friend, or member of the community. *Participants: Meryl Alalof and Elliot Price coordinate this. We have about 56 volunteers who have agreed to participate in this mitzvah.*
- <u>A Gift of Food</u> When a congregant returns home from the hospital following an illness or birth, our Congregation should show our support by providing some food for the family whose name is given by the Rabbi or Temple Office. The Betty Padilla Caring Congregation Fund can cover this expense. *Participants: Meryl Alalof and Jeanie Brody*
- <u>Visiting the III and Elderly</u> Periodic visits to members in the hospital, chronically ill and elderly members especially those congregants without local families would be a valuable service. This would be coordinated by the Rabbi with possible referrals by the telephone committee. *Participants: Meryl Alalof (occasionally)*
- <u>Telephone Calls</u> A telephone committee would call our elderly and ill Congregants to see if they are in need of something as well as to families who have suffered a recent loss or misfortune. The Rabbi will help coordinate this effort and assist with the calls. *Participants: Meryl Alalof (I have been making some phone calls but a committee would be wonderful)*
- Notes Cards to Congregants Whether it is a get well card, congratulatory card, or sympathy card, a note of remembrance means so much to the recipient. The power of the written word provides a long lasting effect. Participants: Elaine Kruskol has been doing a wonderful job with this.
- <u>Transportation to Services</u> Some Congregants depend on others to find transportation to services. The following members have volunteered to do this: Jan Bledsoe, Elliot Price, Rachel Ray, Sarah Bobrow-Williams

Our Caring Community can be of assistance in a number of ways, but it is up to each of us to facilitate this process. The intrinsic rewards are the volunteer's most valuable gifts.

I am asking our Congregants to review this list and choose a group with which to become involved as a member or coordinator. Your volunteer time would be limited – but your efforts would mean so very much to the recipients. Requirements / information:

This scholarship is for the 2015-2016 academic year.

Scholarship is open only to Jewish college students, (graduate or undergraduate) whose parents are members in good standing of Congregation Children of Israel.

Applicants may only receive this scholarship one time during their college career.

Scholarship recipient agrees to speak at a Congregation Children of Israel Brotherhood meeting during or following the academic year of the scholarship about their Jewish campus life and the impact of their Jewish upbringing on their college experience.

Applications for the scholarship must be received by April 7, 2015.

Application must contain all the following:

 - \Rightarrow Freshmen must document anticipated involvement in campus Jewish life
 - Upperclassmen must document involvement in campus Jewish life during previous academic year.
 - \Rightarrow Youth Group, Camp, Temple activities
 - One page essay with the following key points:
 - \Rightarrow A brief personal introduction and biography
 - \Rightarrow Description of Jewish upbringing and education and their impact on the student's life
 - \Rightarrow Long-term career and/or life goals

It would also be great if someone would like to do or share one month out of the year. It could be as simple as hamburgers and hot dogs. We've had a lot of fun because the atmosphere is relaxed even though we work hard. We are definitely not chefs but we try our best. 


