The Board of Trustees adopted a Kashrut Policy that includes the labeling of dairy products that are served at meat meals. The Religious Practices Committee is concerned with this lack of adherence to the adopted Kashrut Policy. If the policy continues to be ignored, it may be necessary to adopt a more stringent policy. The current policy is an attempt to balance the trends in the Reform Movement with wishes of some congregants.

Please help us fill the bins in the entrance area (just outside the office) with non-perishable goods. Just think what we can accomplish if we all bring one item each time we come to the temple.

Assimilation vs. Acculturation (Phew !!!)

Most of Congregation Children of Israel's members do not partake of a wonderful and meaningful service that is held on the third Saturday of each month, namely the Havdalah service. The service is a means of getting together and talking of life's personal lessons and then collectively joining together

to end the Shabbat and look forward to another week.

This past Havdalah a discussion ensued about what it was like to be a Jew in Augusta during the 1920's to 1940's. I made the statement that the Jewish Community had made a concerted effort to assimilate into the larger culture here in Augusta. There was, in fact, a long period where no Bar Mitzvahs took place and the Hymnal looked more like one you would see in a Christian service.

Rabbi Klensin countered that he did not think it was a matter of assimilation but rather one of acculturation. I stated at the time that his response was a matter of semantics. Assimilation is the actual merging of cultural traits from previously distinct groups whereas acculturation was the adopting the cultural traits or social patterns of another group. The latter implication being that you keep your own identity while "borrowing" traits of another culture.

The discussion begs the question, were Jews of that era not proud and confident enough to declare their Jewish identity. By that time Congregation Children of Israel was already over ninety years old and the average family was that of merchants, some professionals and working class individuals. We were somewhat welcomed into the area but it seems that we were not totally accepted in it. That would have to wait until after the hospital industry expanded here and the development of Plant Vogle when more Jewish families moved into town. Even now we have to express our Judaism against a majority that has very little first hand knowledge of who we are.

In hindsight I have to agree with Rabbi Klensin, it was acculturation rather than assimilation. We Jews that still practice our religion are in fact very proud of it while still fitting in to the larger non-Jewish community and the studies that were done twenty years ago concluding that there would be no Jewish Community by now were wrong. All the disparate Jewish groups are well represented here.

Finally, I would be remiss if I did not mention the pride that we all felt as Jewish Americans when we saw Aly Raisman do her floor exercises at the Olympics to the tune of Hava Nagillah. It had just been a few days earlier that the Wall Street Journal had run a story on the lack of enthusiasm of young Jews to accept the continued use of the song at weddings and Bar Mitzvahs. Miss Raisman chose to make a statement in the most public of venues. She and her family obviously have "acculturated" by fitting in to main stream American life while keeping their Judaism alive. Thank you Aly!

I am delighted our Board of Trustees has given me the approval and opportunity to spear head an event about my passion—BE THE MATCH—The National Bone Marrow Registry. I have done research on this topic and kept thinking what a mitz-vah this could be. Having been a recipient of 2 transplants and seeing the need for

more donors to be added to the registry, I have become an advocate of this cause.

I was fortunate to be able to use my own stem cells the first time and on the second transplant, my youngest brother was my donor. It is so sad seeing others who don't have siblings (who, by the way, don't always provide a match), await a match from somebody somewhere and pray there will be one. It is truly devastating.

Blood cancers can occur out of the blue – I am a perfect example of that. I was as healthy as could be one day (having never missed a day of work due to illness in 30+ years) and diagnosed with Stage III T Cell Lymphoma the next. One just doesn't know.

I am ever so grateful for where I am today and have made myself a promise that, while I could, I would do something to help others who are fighting these horrible blood cancers. As Jews should we reward bad behavior?

Lisa Brown Silenced on Michigan house Floor for saying the word Vagina. Below is her speech from June 13, 2012

"I'm Jewish. I keep kosher in my home. Judaism believes that therapeutic abortion, namely abortions performed in order to preserve the life of the mother are not only permissible but mandatory. The stage of pregnancy does not matter. Wherever there is a question of the life of the mother or that of the unborn child, Jewish law rules in favor of preserving the life of the mother. The status of the fetus as human life does not equal that of the mother. I have not asked for you to adopt and adhere to my religious beliefs. Why are you asking me to adopt yours? And finally, Mr. Speaker I am flattered that you're all so interested in my vagina. "

As Jews should we reward bad behavior? Lisa Brown, Michigan State Representative is being praised for her speech to the Michigan State House during an abortion bill debate. She has also been made a martyr after being banned from speaking on the house floor for saying the word vagina. I think we have come a long way since Roe v. Wade. Whether you agree or disagree with the bill there is a way to fight your fight. While I have no problem with the word vagina I do take offense to Lisa Brown's statement. I am also Jewish. I do not keep a kosher home and do not agree with the statement that Judaism believes that therapeutic abortions are not only permissible but mandatory. In the first place what does keeping a kosher home have to do with anything? Are you a better Jew or human being because you do not eat pork? I believe what is in your heart is more important then what is in your stomach. In the second place as an involved member of a Reform congregation I feel that my belief in a women's choice is a personal belief not a religious one. I do not think we can be so judgmental and I believe at least for me that this would be a much more difficult decision. I was blessed with a healthy pregnancy and a beautiful healthy little girl. I pray I will never be faced with such a heart wrenching decision. I do not agree with Lisa Brown's view or interpretation of the Talmud or Jewish Bible. Was there even such a thing as an abortion or a therapeutic abortion back in biblical times? I believe how we interpret the Talmud and The Jewish Bible is open for discussion and I have a real problem with Lisa Brown speaking for all Jews. Last time I checked this is America and we have religious freedom. Isn't that what you Ms. Brown were trying to stand behind? Religious freedom means having the right to believe what we want and that we do not have to believe everything that our clergy and leaders tell us. When are we going to stop attacking each other and making statements simply to incite hatred and rage or simply to put us in the public eye? Again, I have no problem with the word vagina but simply have a problem in the way that it was used and in what the intended result was when using it. Let us all start listening, agree to disagree and be respectful. Maybe then we can work together and get things accomplished.
