RELIGIOUS PRACTICES

We have a Caring Congregation Committee. But is a committee all there is to it? Can we sit back and leave it to a committee to make us a Caring Congregation? The Religious Practices Committee and I believe the answer to these questions must be a resounding NO! To our mind, in order to call ourselves a "Caring Congregation" we must all be involved in the process. This month I will address a few aspects of our vision of a Caring Congregation.

If someone is in need of help, or even just reassurance, each of us should make sure that the people in our congregation who can help are aware of the need. All too often we simply assume that someone will take care of it. Many would help if they knew their help was needed, but without the first call, the need is ignored for lack of knowledge. We should be a congregation that is present and responsive to their people, no matter where they are in life's journey, a congregation that links person-to-person and generation-to-generation.

When a death occurs in the family of a congregant, we must be supportive of their needs. This means more than just providing a Meal of Condolence. We must also ensure that a minyan is available for Shiva Services as many nights as the family desires to observe this. We must also ensure that holding a Shiva Service does not oblige the bereaved family to provide refreshments following the service. The congregation should ensure that any refreshments are provided, set out, and cleaned up after.

I encourage all of you to contact me if you would like to participate on the Religious Practices Committee or with any questions/suggestions you have.

Rabbinic Reflections



Soon we will be observing Passover, one of the most important Jewish holidays of the year, or some would argue the most important.

We all know about the four questions during the Passover Seder, but there are other questions we often ask. The most important question is what we will be thinking about during the Seder. Of course, we will be thankful for family and friends sharing Passover with us. And we should be thinking about how grateful we are to be free, remembering that as long as some are still enslaved, none of us are really free. We should be thinking about, and taking about, slavery as it exists in our world today, both what we normally think of as slavery and the human traffic trafficking that is so horrific even in our own country.

This year many will be thinking about the lack of freedom for women at the Kotel, the Western Wall in Jeru-

salem, where women have repeatedly been abused and arrested for wearing a tallit or carrying and trying to read a Torah Scroll, in the Women's section of the Wall. Reform and Conservative women in Israel, and their supporters throughout the world are fighting for their right to observe their Judaism. Even a group of Israeli veterans who freed the wall in the 1967 Six Day War, are joining together ,once again, to free the wall, from the limitations imposed by the extremist Orthodox Jews who have control of the Wall.

When we say, "may all who are hungry, come and eat," let us remember those who go to bed hungry every night, throughout the world and even in our own country. Please read the article on the next page about hunger and Mazon, a Jewish response to hunger.

And then there are other questions such as how long is Passover? Most people, and almost all calendars, say that Passover lasts eight days. But if you look in the Torah, you will read that Passover lasts for seven days. And in Israel, everyone observes Passover for seven days. Why the difference? Because centuries ago an extra day was added to Passover and many other holidays for Jews living in the Diaspora. (No one adds an extra day to Yom Kippur or to Chanukah, although many children would like another day or two of Chanukah.) Why the extra day for Passover in the Diaspora? Because this was done before there were set calendars. Each new month began only when the new moon was observed in Jerusalem. Signals were sent to the Jews living in Babylonia and elsewhere in the Diaspora, but sometimes the signals did not get though in time, without modern communication. Orthodox and Conservative Juda-ism teaches that even though we have modern communication and calendars which are set in advance today, because the custom of the extra day of the holiday in the Diaspora was followed for so many years, the extra day should still be observed. Our Reform Judaism teaches that since the original reason for the extra day no longer exists, we can go back to the practice as taught in the Torah and as followed by all Jews in Israel, of observing only seven days. (Actually, there is an exception to the observance of only seven days of Passover in Israel: Orthodox Jews from the Diaspora who are visiting Israel are required to still observe eight days. If they make Aliyah, moving to Israel permanently, they then are to follow Israeli custom.)

So, this year, for Reform Jews, the last (seventh) day of Passover will be April 1. For Orthodox and Conservative Jews in the Diaspora, the last (eighth) day will be April 2.

Another question which is often asked is what we are and are not supposed to eat on Passover. Most of us know that we are supposed to eat matza on Passover, although technically the Mitzvah (commandment) to eat matza is only during the Passover Seder—we just are not allowed to eat leavened bread for all of Passover. Most Jews strive not to eat leavened food during the whole week of Passover. That means unless the food is specially made for Passover, one does eat anything made from grains - so no cake or cookies, no pasta, no cereal, etc. Some Jews will not eat anything on Passover that is not certified kosher for Passover, including meat, jam, wine, and even soda. But then it gets more complicated—certified by whom? Ashkenazic Jews, which includes most Jews in our congregation and in the United States, traditionally do not eat legumes (beans, peas, etc.) on Passover. Because legumes grow in pods like grains, and because one might make flour from some legumes, there might be confusion. Sephardic Jews, whose ancestors originally came from Spain, including most Jews in Mediterranean countries, do eat legumes. Thus a traditional Ashkenazic Jew would want to be sure that the food was certified kosher by an Ashkenazic authority. What about in Reform Judaism? Most Reform Jews come from Ashkenazic backgrounds and therefore think they are supposed to follow the Ashkenazic custom of not eating legumes.

It gets a little complicated, doesn't it? **But, please don't take the attitude of this is so complicated I am not going to worry about what I eat on Passover at all.** As Reform Jews we ought to at least avoid things like bread and regular cookies and cakes, but beyond that, we make our own decisions about how strict we are going to be. In fact, there are many Reform Jews today, including a number of Reform Rabbis who suggest that we no longer need to follow this non-Biblical prohibition regarding legumes, since they (Continued on page 5) are not actually Chametz (leavened). Those who have converted to Judaism, do not come from Ashkenazic or Sephardic traditions, although if they marry someone who was born into a Jewish family, they will usually follow that family's traditions. But, even for those who have been Jews all our lives, we may want to include string beans or other legumes in our Passover diets. Just be aware that if you invite others to eat in your home at the Seder or anytime during Passover, that they may not be comfortable eating legumes.

The questions about exactly what we eat and the reasons for the seven or eight days of the holiday, are interesting, and very important for some, but, please, try to focus on the real messages of Passover as I discussed at the beginning of this column.

Passover is a special time when we gather with family and friends to retell the story of our people's freedom from bondage. We read from a prayer book, perform rituals that are thousands of years old, and eat A LOT of delicious and symbolic foods. Unfortunately, not everyone is lucky enough to have that luxury.

Hunger in America is at an epidemic level. 50 million Americans – nearly 1 in 6 – struggle to put enough nutritious food on the table every day. One out of every five Israelis can't be sure when or if they'll have their next meal. These statistics are tragic, and they inspire our daily work. But at Passover, when it can seem as though the primary purpose of the Seder is to eat (and eat and eat), we feel the discomfort a bit more keenly.

We set the stage early in the Seder, saying, "All who are hungry, let them enter and eat." We move ceremoniously through the Haggadah, reminding ourselves that we once were slaves in Egypt and explaining the meaning of each bite we eat. But millions of Americans and Israelis have only a lack of food, which has a very different meaning – it is a reminder that they are *still* enslaved.

This year, please join us as we again ask The Fifth Question: *Why on this night are millions of people still going hungry?*

Incorporate The Fifth Question into your Passover Seder

After the youngest person reads the four questions from the Haggadah, ask *The Fifth Question* and reflect as a group upon the crisis of hun ger, why it persists and what you individually and collectively could do to end it.

Raise awareness about hunger in your community Contact your elected officials to advocate on behalf of those who so desperately need our help.

Organize a campaign in your community to raise awareness about hunger.

Share your blessings

Donate to MAZON. Give as much as you can or what you would have spent feeding one more person at your Seder table.

No Justice When the Game is Rigged: Unintended Casualties of Current U.S. Immigration Policy

American principles of justice have traditionally been ones of fairness and proportionality. However, since 1997, inconsistencies in the application of immigration laws and the often radical consequences for violations have led to major disincentives for immigrants as well as the understandable, but frequently misinformed, anger of reasonable people who just want their neighbors to follow the rules. This talk is intended to provide a brief explanation of the common "paths to papers" as they exist today and how they are regulated by the agencies tasked by Congress to uphold the law, followed by a Q&A/discussion session about immigration-related issues.

JELF: INTEREST FREE STUDENT LOANS FOR JEWISH STUDENTS

The Jewish Educational Loan Fund has been helping Jewish students in the 5 state southeast region of Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina and Virginia attain their dreams of a higher education by granting them need-based, interest-free loans since 1961. These interest-free loans provide the final dollars that bridge the gap between a student's total financial resources and the cost of attending school.

There is no fee to apply for a JELF loan. However, in order to qualify, a loan applicant:

Must be Jewish

Must be a U.S. citizen or a legal resident and a resident of GA, FL, NC, SC, or VA for at least one year prior to completing the JELF loan application.

Must need a JELF loan for post-secondary education for the 2013-2014 school year for undergraduate study, graduate school, or a vocational program

Must be a full-time student

Must complete an online application between March 1 and April 30 or between September 1 and September 30, 2013

Must demonstrate financial need




